When a Mother Prays » On a beautiful Sabbath morning in early December 2017, I awakened with anticipation as I looked forward to hearing our prospective pastor speak during the church service. In the midst of breakfast preparations, our home phone rang. I answered even though I thought it might be a telemarketer. The voice on the other end said, "Hi, are you Nelcia Roehm?" "Yes, I am," I replied. "Do you have a son?" the voice asked. My heart began pounding and a sense of fear came over me. The voice, that of a chaplain from St. Mary's Hospital, wanted to be sure she was speaking to the right person, again asking "Do you have a son?"

Overhearing the conversation from the living room, my husband came to my aid and I handed him the phone, unable to hear what she was about to tell me. While my husband spoke with the chaplain, I walked down the hall to Nertyrus' room. Opening the door, I noticed that his bed was empty and hadn't been slept in. I looked out the window to see that his car was not in the yard. That's when I knew that something had happened to my younger son.

Our 22-year-old son, Nertyrus, we learned, had been in a terrible car accident a few hours earlier, and was in critical condition at St. Mary's Hospital. We were asked to come quickly!

I thought back to a day in 2015 when I had watched a movie and read the book "War Room!" It inspired to me to begin a radical prayer life and to deepen my relationship with God through prayer. My number one purpose was to pray both my children back to the Lord.

My son Nertyrus had been living in a 'far country.' He smoked pot, drank alcohol, hung out with the wrong crowd, was openly defiant to my husband and me and had come in contact with law enforcement on a number of occasions.

When our backs are against the wall, the movie suggested, when it seems like the enemy has come in and taken up residence in our lives, in our homes, and our families, we are to seek the Lord in prayer. I clearly remember creating my war room using my bedroom closet. I was ready to go into battle for my sons' lives, I was going to use this one and only weapon that I had. The devil had too much power over my son.

"Dear Lord," I prayed, "my family is in trouble. My boys have lost their way. They are walking the path of

destruction. I need Jesus to intervene in their lives. Lord will you please listen, Lord will you please hear my prayer, Lord Please answer."

As we made that dreadful drive to the hospital, I sent an SOS to heaven. I had no eloquent words, or fancy articulations, but between sobs, I simply asked God to save my son's life.

When we got to the hospital, we were briefed on his condition. Nertyrus had a traumatic brain injury, he was intubated, on life support and had a scapula fracture, a clavicle fracture, and a diffuse axel injury, a shearing of the brain. The prognosis was not good.

One of the first things after this briefing was inform family, along with church leaders, of our need, asking them to pray. The church interrupted their service to pray for Nertyrus. About to give his interview sermon, our prospective pastor Nate Skaffe, interceded for someone he had never met. The congregation pleaded with God for his life, for healing, for strength and courage for our family and for restoration. Thousands of people in the United States and in the Caribbean were praying.

While in ICU, Netrtyrus began to awaken just a few days after the accident, even though doctors didn't expect him to awaken at all, especially not this early. His breathing tube was taken out four days post injury!

After a week and a half, we began talking about next steps. Exploring the best options, we chose Craig Rehabilitation Hospital in Denver.

Three months at Craig Hospital and Nertyrus was ready to continue his rehabilitation at home. He was strong, walking on his own, and becoming very independent. But, that's just part of the good news.

Nertyrus no longer wants the life that he lived before. He is attending church and says, "I don't know why God saved me, but He did it for a reason, and I am going to live my life in search of that reason." What we initially thought was a tragic event, we now see as a trial turned into a blessing from God. What the enemy meant for evil, God has turned into good. Don't get me wrong, this accident has been a challenge for us as a family. The emotional, financial and physical strain has been overwhelming. However, the transformation in Nertyrus' life has made it worth it.

Transformative Power of Christ's Resurrection

> The cross itself, in short, stands at the center of the Christian message, the Christian story, and the Christian life and mission. It has lost none of its revolutionary and transformative power down through the centuries. The cross is where the great story of God and creation, focused on the strange story of God and Israel and then focused still more sharply on the personal story of God and Jesus, came into terrible but life-giving clarity. The crucifixion of Jesus of Nazareth was a one-off event, the one on behalf of the many, the one moment in history on behalf of all others through which sins would be forgiven, the powers robbed of their power, and humans redeemed to take their place as worshippers and stewards, celebrating the powerful victory of God in his Messiah and so gaining the Spirit's power to make his kingdom effective in the world.

The message for us, then, is plain. Forget the "works contract," with its angry, legalistic divinity. Forget the false either/or that plays different "theories of atonement" against one another. Embrace the "covenant of vocation" or, rather, be embraced by it as the Creator calls you to a genuine humanness at last, calls and equips you to bear and reflect his image. Celebrate the revolution that happened once for all when the power of love overcame the love of power. And, in the power of that same love, join in the revolution here and now.
