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ACS Closes after 38 Years of Denver Operation »

After 38 years of serving the Denver community, Adventist Community Services Community L.I.F.T. is closing its operation on August 17 due to lack of funding. The closure was announced on August 2 by action of the Executive Committee of the Rocky Mountain Conference.

The Executive Committee voted "to reluctantly recognize the need to close ACS Community L.I.F.T. at this time due to lack of funding and support from constituent churches," the action stated.

ACS Community L.I.F.T. served thousands of children and adults with its food bank and medical clinic. Since 1979, Denver's Barnum neighborhood was a fixture on First Avenue east of Sheridan, and in April 2016 received a much-needed lift of its own, managers said, when volunteers with the nonprofit group Rebuilding Together Metro Denver were assisted by Lowes volunteers in giving the ACS Community L.I.F.T. building an update.

Stephanie Denning, chair of the ACS Community L.I.F.T. Board of Trustees presented ACS's current financial position and outlined two options for the center. These included an increase of funding and support from the conference and constituent churches, or closing the facility.

Over the years, donations and financial support from RMC made the operation possible, but repeatedly was short with necessary funding to continue the service.

According to George Crumley, RMC vice president for finance, after selling the building and assets, and after debts have been paid, any funds remaining will be held as potential seed money for future operations. Two salaried staff members will be paid through the end of August.

"It is the hope to see a new partnership develop between the conference, churches and Adventist hospitals to continue this much-needed ministry in the Denver metro community," Crumley says.

Pastors and Teachers Meeting Focuses on Relationships »

Teachers and pastors from all corners of the Rocky
Mountain Conference gathered August 7-9 at LifeSource
Adventist Fellowship to review leadership and relationship
roles between church and school. Dr. Stanley Patterson, chair
of and professor for Christian ministry at Andrews University,
led the discussions.



To increase familiarity between pastors and teachers and work on building relationships, says Kari Lange of HMS Richards Adventist School, attendees were randomly assigned tables. This type of mix and meet is especially good for those just starting to get their feet wet, like Jessyka Albert, the discipleship pastor at the Boulder Seventh-day Adventist Church. A 2016 graduate of Union College, my former classmate smiles as she sums up the event. "It's a typical bunch of pastors and teachers in a room with lots of conversations, wisdom, and advice to share. It's been fun! I'm still soaking it all in."

To house such a large group, LifeSource Adventist Fellowship's central location and size heavily influenced the selection of location, explains RMC ministerial director Craig Carr. Holding the meetings in Denver is "convenient for the local people, and others can stay nearby in the selection of hotels. And, those from the far reaches can make this a fun shopping adventure."

Craig enthuses that Stanley, a personal friend, is the perfect speaker for this kind of meeting. "He has the heart of a pastor; he's the kind of guy who I wouldn't say is rebellious but is one who helps others see things from a different, godly angle. Stanley has a deep relationship with Jesus."

With seventeen years of pastoral ministry under his belt, a Ph.D. in Leadership and Administration obtained from Andrews University in 2007, and a dissertation exploring leadership roles and relationships of pastors and educators in the context of the Seventh-day Adventist church school, Stanley is more than prepared for this get-together.

"Part of what Stanley is unpacking is his dissertation in relation between pastors and teachers at a local level; clarifying their roles and cooperation, as outside the Church manual/policy book, there's not much formal guidance on what this relationship should look like," says Craig. "Stanley's research is very extensive, and he says it as it is."

LifeSource Adventist Fellowship Welcomes Local Families to Seventh Annual Neighborhood Party »

LifeSource Adventist Fellowship celebrated its seventh annual neighborhood party, August 7, attracting 300-500 community and church members for an evening of family activities, free dinner, and a community car show.



While the community car show was an incentive for car buffs and motor enthusiasts to sport their classic rides, a waterslide, lawn games, face-painting, a fun bus and train ride, obstacle course, snow cones, and laser tag drew in families. Of course, the attractions appealed to adults, too, as RMC administrative assistant Carol Bolden and Boulder Seventh-day Adventist Church's discipleship pastor Jessyka Albert raced each other through an inflated obstacle course.

"As a church, we are about two things: serving the community, and raising kids and families," explains Tim Cress, leader of children's ministries at LifeSource. The neighborhood party is one of six annual events hosted by LifeSource, designed to attract and keep families and children in the church. The event also attracts low-income families with an opportunity to socialize and enhance children's education. Tim shares that 100 backpacks were arranged to be given to such families in attendance.

Additionally, a policeman, sporting his sleek blue police sedan, revamped with a new set of speakers, taught children



about car safety and the laws of the road. Also present was an informational display for families detailing children's life phases, similar to that seen in the children's wing of the church, addressing children's ever-evolving needs, thoughts, and spiritual questions.

opened the Chapel Haven evangelistic series July 9 with 136 in attendance, 70 percent from the surrounding community.

Using SermonView, a company that targets neighborhoods based on purchasing habits and which aims its mailings toward those most likely to respond, the church blanketed the surrounding community with advertising for the event. This is the same organization used by the Voice of Prophecy.

Chapel Haven's members are living a "culture of evangelism," explains Pastor Roy Weeden about their fourth evangelistic series in the past two years, "rather than focusing on events."

An international speaker and former associate evangelist at It Is Written, Mark Fox has been sharing basic Adventist doctrine.

The son of an Adventist pastor, Mark was a rebellious teenager who made "some destructive choices," he explains regretfully. But having experienced life from "the other side," Mark is able to identify with people from many walks of life.

"Our church members have been absolutely enthralled as they see the power of allowing Scriptures to interpret themselves."

Besides weekend events during the past two years, church members have also held Bible studies with community people and have developed a "culture of expectation."

"The whole thing has been remarkable," enthuses Roy, "in that even after [presenting] our testing truths, we are still averaging 60 to 70 coming out night after night."

According to Roy, the church is expecting 15 to 20 baptisms this weekend. "Even before the appeal for baptism was given," he explains, [people were] asking 'What would it take to become a member of this church?"

The final presentation will take place Sabbath evening when Mark Fox will share his own testimony.

At the 9,000 feet elevation, the view was spectacular. Sunny, mild weather added to the joy of mountain worship.





In her book You'll Laugh About This Someday: Devotions for Frazzled Moms, author Melissa Howell captures the essence of motherhood with its exhausting rituals and responsibilities, and sleep-deprived hardship juxtaposed alongside the exquisite sweetness of a sleeping child heavy in

one's arms.



A mother of four, ages eight and under, including two-year-old twins, she knows the struggle of balancing time for God, work, and family. Throughout the madness of caring for four small individuals, snapshots of God flicker across her consciousness. She realizes that a chaotic life can be anchored in a deep knowledge that God is and makes a

difference in our days.

Written as a devotional with "In Case You Get Six Minutes to Yourself Study Questions" at the end of each chapter, Melissa's devotional finds humor in the down and dirty moments of caring for littles.

Nothing about it is sugarcoated, even in the candid telling

of screaming angry words and joining her kids in a good cry when she was hit in the eyeball with a whipping rope.

The life lessons she draws and the spiritual insights she shares will encourage other frazzled moms in the trenches of motherhood.

Although I'm no longer the mother of littles, I can certainly identify with her stretched-to-the-limit-and-beyond moments, as well as her appreciation for those precious moments that sometimes show up unexpectedly—those "I love you, Mommy" moments that melt your heart and bring tears to your eyes.

Melissa's devotional reminded me to take time for God, for my kids, for myself—to be silent and to listen for that still, small voice even in the midst of chaos.
