Church Growth and Stewardship Emphasized at RMC Executive Committee »

Reporting on the state of the church in the Rocky Mountain Conference, RMC administrators shared encouraging news that church membership has increased to more than 18,500, an increase of more than 500 new members over the previous year. Eric Nelson, VP for Administration and until recently, coordinator of evangelism, also reported that “Revelation Speaks Peace” evangelistic outreach in Denver concluded with more than 150 decisions for baptism.

“The conference would like to express appreciation for the Voice of Prophecy’s Shawn Boonstra and his team, for conducting the series from January 5 through February 3,” Nelson said. He added that, “pastors of the nearly 30 churches in the Denver area say that “more [baptisms] will come as follow-up with interested guests continues.”

Reviewing the statistics, Nelson reported nearly 2,000 Bible study interests within the Denver-metro area. More than 800 of them attended the meetings. In the early days of the outreach 60 percent guests and 40 percent members were present. More than 450 members from 30 churches volunteered to staff the meetings as greeters, ushers, registrars and other services for the guests. “They came nightly with smiles and infectious warmth to all who attended,” Nelson commented. Currently, there are nearly 200 individuals who have made decisions for baptism, and many of the churches have 400-600 names to follow up.


“There was also a revival among members seeing Christ transform their own lives and the guest’s lives as well as the Ellie Caulkins staff who could often be seen listening inside during the meeting time,” Nelson added.

The committee was informed that total tithe for 2017 was \$16,347,828, which was a 1.77 percent increase over 2016 tithe. Base tithe, which excludes windfalls, was up .65 percent. George Crumley, VP for finance said, “It is important that we have a strong base tithe since it is off of that number that we budget the subsequent year.” He also stated that overall “we were pleased with the positive increases in both

areas since 2016 had been a 53-Sabbath year and many times, the year that follows results in a negative tithe. With final adjustments to our 2017 Operating Financial Statement, we anticipate to show a bit of an operational increase.”

The 2018 Revised Budget was also presented. According to Crumley, “even though we were budgeting off of a slight increase in base tithe from 2017, it was not sufficient to provide enough of a base to balance our budget without some assistance from our Medical Reserve Fund. For 2018, RMC is relying on \$159,628 from that fund.”

Crumley said that, “if indeed our performance during 2018 is better than budgeted, we will return part or all of those budgeted funds to our reserve. This is not something we would want to do on an ongoing basis, but it does allow us to preserve employment levels at this time without needing to make immediate adjustments.”

The committee was also informed that the Adventist Book Center closed the year with an unaudited decrease in operations of around \$31,000. The RMC ABC has consistently shown an increase in operations for years. The ABC is facing numerous challenges due to changing market dynamics that have been evolving over the last number of years. The inventory and expenses have been managed carefully, but have been challenged on the revenue side, according to Crumley. “But moving forward, we will be looking at ways to strengthen the revenue side of operations.”

Referring to the most current data, Crumley said the RMC tithe report for January showed a 5.34 percent gain over last year. “This is a strong start to the new year,” he commented.

Newday Christian Seventh-day Church pastors, David Kennedy and Edwin Vargas, shared an update on the progress of the downtown Denver church plant, located in the diverse community of Five Points. Kennedy informed committee members of the official launch date of March 31, and noted that several guests from the community are attending their services. Benchmarks were voted to measure the church’s success over the next three years. These include targets for attendance, stewardship, and impact on the community.

The committee also discussed the current situation with the Student Literature Evangelism Program. The RMC constituency voted for the conference to fund the LE program, with the conference budget setting aside \$150,000 annually for this purpose.

“The success of the current program has very much depended on the vision and experience of working with the youth under the leadership of Joe Martin. He has announced his retirement this year and the conference understands the

importance of finding a new leader that will have the passion to develop and run a quality, spiritually led program which aims to be a blessing to the students as well as to the communities that are reached,” said Nelson. He informed the committee that the conference would continue with an update as the search progresses.

The Executive Committee voted to establish a Stewardship Committee. During the RMC constituency meeting in July, the conference was requested to establish a stewardship committee to be tasked with looking for ways of encouraging faithfulness in returning tithes and offerings.

The focus of the committee includes brainstorming ideas to motivate, educate, equip and inspire church members in their faithfulness to the Lord with their tithes and offerings; evaluating the flow of tithe; and functioning as a positive tool to educate and encourage our members in their stewardship journey. It was voted to adopt a plan for the nine-member committee to function for two years, meet no less than twice a year, and report to the Executive Committee.

Eric Nelson also reported that the Casper church welcomes Shawn Vincent as their new pastor beginning March 1. A pastoral position for the Cortez church is open, and Denver South is interviewing an associate in the near future.

together to recall answers for one-point true/false questions and 6-8 point fill-in-the-blank questions requiring complete recall. Both teams scored 90 percent or above to qualify for a first-place finish allowing them to move on to the North American Division level.

The NAD is the highest level of testing for the teams where as many as 100 teams from across the United States and the United Kingdom come together to compete. For the first time, the Las Aguilas team made it past the Mid-America Union level. It is the fourth time for the Cougars.

"As exciting and rewarding as placement at this level is, the real excitement and satisfaction is leading a team through God's Word and watching them grow in wisdom, stature, and favor with God," shares Phyllis Zimmerman, team coach.

Zimmerman believes that the primary reason all teams across the Rocky Mountain Conference should participate is not only for the fun, comradery, discipline, confidence and skills that the Pathfinder develops from the process of study, but for the love and excitement that both coach and players obtain for the Word of God and His working in the lives of His people at that period of history (Daniel and Esther) and today (you and I). "It is the ultimate reward to ignite a love for the Word of God. We encourage and invite other Pathfinder Ministries to join in this experience" Zimmerman emphasizes.

Mile High Academy and Loma Linda University Hold Live Webinar Session »

Mile High Academy students and teachers, along with Rocky Mountain Conference partners, participated in a Loma Linda University live webinar dedicated to STEM (Integrated Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) and EXCEED (Excellence in STEM Experiential Education) on February 13.

Session speakers included upper-school teacher, Brian Howard, and IT director, Tyler Rettler.

During the webinar, students were exposed to the prosthetics work being carried out at Loma Linda University using 3-D printing to create the prosthetics and orthotics. The importance of math within science and engineering was also emphasized.

Other speakers included Leroy Oddie who shared his work at Myomo, a company that empowers individuals with a neuromuscular condition who have lost movement in a hand and arm to perform activities of everyday life, and what he does at Loma Linda University with prosthetics; and Chris DeKay, RAFT representative, explained what RAFT

(Resource Area For Teaching) in Denver has to offer. RAFT's mission is to empower educators with affordable resources to build their student's minds through hands-on learning. See their website at www.raftcolorado.org

Within the context of Real World Learning, students were introduced to Loma Linda University's work in prosthetics and orthotics. They also discussed the importance of STEM in future careers. Lastly, they gained a valuable resource in RAFT, which they can apply to future classroom projects and even outside projects.

This is just the beginning of a partnership between the Denver community and Loma Linda University that has the potential of connecting students with their futures.
