



Rocky Mountain Conference leaders re-elected at

Constituency Session » The 2017 Constituency Session of the Rocky Mountain Conference of Seventh-day Adventists convened July 23 at Life Source Adventist Fellowship, Denver, Colorado. Delegates voted to re-elect Ed Barnett, Eric Nelson, and George Crumley, as president, vice president for administration, and vice president for finance, respectively, for the next quinquennium.



The Constituency Session convened under the theme "Living for His Return" and brought nearly 570 delegates from 130 churches in Colorado, Wyoming and part of New Mexico. In his opening devotional message, Barnett emphasized that as Adventists "we believe that Jesus is coming soon and we need to share Him with everyone who lives in our territory."


The delegates accepted the reports on the state of the church in RMC. Responding to presentations by the RMC officers, delegates offered a commentary on issues, which they feel should be addressed by the church within the conference.

Lining up at the microphones, delegates emphasized a need to see a greater involvement of young church members in the work of the church, helping them understand how tithes and offerings are being spent. This was seen as a strategic area for the Conference to address.

"I encourage our administrative officers to look closely, in

their strategic planning for the next five years, at our current use of church funds, the percentages that go to various line items, and the amount we send up the chain to the Union, Division and GC, and to include our younger, more financially savvy members, on the committees that decide how our funds are allocated," said Mark Johnson, a delegate from Boulder.



Several delegates spoke about a need for a more active involvement of the church and its educational leaders in issues central to contemporary Adventist education, channeled through the K-12 Board with greater frequency and attention.

The RMC leaders were also asked to re-establish continuing financial support for the Student Literature Evangelism program. What was once supported from budgetary appropriations now relies on fundraising. Bob Kenison, a delegate from Cheyenne, proposed that the Conference consider re-funding the program. This proposal was approved by delegates.

The last agenda item of the Session included presentations by Alex Bryant, secretary of he North American Division, and Gary Thurber, president of Mid-America Union Conference, on the current world church discussion about the General Conference's Unity of Mission document. In preparation for the Session, delegates were provided with documents commenting on the Unity in Mission document, which aims to addresses the question of policy compliance by church entities and procedures in church reconciliation when entities are out of step with policy.

A discussion centered on a motion proposed by Ed Reifsnyder, a delegate from Campion, for the Session "take no action on the Unity in Mission document, and the Rocky Mountain Conference's statement regarding it." Several delegates expressed concerns about the potential implications of the adoption of the document by the upcoming Fall Council of the church in October.

Before long, Samaan was officially invited to be part of the Sage Creek Band. To prove his place, he was presented with a cowboy shirt embroidered with the band's name. Ed Barnett, RMC president, made the presentation.

The band's leader, Dennis Pumford, who pastors the Casper congregation, said of Dr Samaan's first performance that "it was an experience. It created a lot of good humor and rapport with the congregation. That's the best we can say.

Ron Hughes, a guitarist and composer of theme songs for Wyoming camp meeting recollected that when Dennis came along, he changed everything, so we've had a lot of fun since he's been here [in Casper] and they've asked me to write songs for each camp meeting and that's what I've done."



On writing songs, Ron explained that "usually, they give me the idea. They say, "This is the theme of the camp meeting. Can you write a song for it?" I say, "No, I can't, but God can."

He continued, "Gotta' give it to God. I tried writing songs before I became a Christian and they were terrible. They were secular songs and nobody wanted to listen to them. When I became a Christian, I started writing about what I cared about -- Christian country music. [Actually] the genre of the music is country gospel, southern gospel. Yeah."

Dr Samaan's presentations included practical applications presented in the teachings of Jesus. "He put Jesus right into our daily life," said one participant.

"Let us not be defined by the world, but let Jesus define

In an engaging Sabbath School presentation, Chuck Gadway, pastor from Sheridan, challenged the audience to stay on God's mission. "We are so busy doing our mission that we forget about God's mission," he said. "What do people see and hear when they come to our churches?" Gadway asked.

Pastor Gadway is working on invitations to speakers for the next five years. Next year, Dick Stenbakken, a former director of Adventist Chaplaincy Ministries, and a well-known presenter is scheduled to speak at the 2018 convocation.

We need to get the word out as "I am not sure everybody knows how good a camp meeting is," Gadway commented. "The facilities have been improved to be more welcoming to visitors," he added. The changes in the auditorium were coordinated by Dennis Pumford, a soon-retiring pastor of the Casper Church. He acknowledged the work done by many people to make the improvements.

Those who expressed their appreciation for the musical part of the Wyoming Camp meeting were also noting Pumford's musical contributions to the "one and only Gospel band we have been enjoying over the years," as stated by one of the participants.

Gadway did not hesitate to express his take-away from the event. "This was a great spiritual blessing to those who have been here."



The Sabbath afternoon program included a celebration of Robert Walker's baptism. He lives on the mountain and was baptized by Eric Nelson, RMC vice president for administration, a friend from school days.

Dr Samaan sensed that, for him, the camp meeting displayed "a spirit of fellowship and Christian comradery. People felt at home in associating with each other here. I believe that when Jesus is uplifted, He pulls people together as when the disciples were of one accord. RMC Executive Committee Apprised of the "Cleanest Audit Report" for the Conference » With

the approach of the RMC 2017 Constituency Session, the outgoing RMC Executive Committee met on July 18. The committee members were apprised of the final preparations for the Session and also heard reports on the finances, including tithes and offerings. Reporting to the Committee, George Crumley, vice president for finance, informed that tithe income was running lower than last year at the same time.



"Some of this is the result of having one less Sabbath yearto-date this year than last year," he said. But, even with tithe running lower, "we are tracking well from a budgetary perspective primarily because of expenses running under budget at this stage of the year," he said. It was also reported that the RMC ABC is operating close to where they were last year at the same time.

A plan was shared for the utilization of funds from the sale of the Adventist Community Services (ACS) building and how eligible constituent churches from the Denver Metropolitan area can make a request for some of these funds to use for local community service needs in their area. These requests will be reviewed by the appropriate governing committee. The committee discussed guidelines on setting up a successful Community Service program at a local church and how to receive funding.

The chair of the Audit Review Committee provided a report regarding the 2016 fiscal year-end audit. The conference was issued a clean audit opinion, "the best opinion that can be received," and the committee voted to accept the report. Chairperson Gary Ketchum shared that "this is the cleanest audit report that he has observed in all the years he has served in this position. "The auditors completed their review earlier than planned due to the good work of RMC staff," he said.

Several administrative actions were taken, including changing the name of the Worland School to Sonshine Academy, and of the Alamosa School to Cornerstone Christian Academy.

Since the committee meeting was the last for this quinquennium, its members expressed appreciation to their colleagues who faithfully served on the committee. Eight of them will not be returning to the Executive Committee for the next five-year term. Following are the names of those recognized, based on the Nominating Committee report to be voted at the constituency on July 23: Trina Folkenberg, Gary Ketchum, Jason Logan, Ricardo Melendez, Sam Miller, David Rodriguez, Steve Schwarz, and Carol Turk.

Montrose Church members treated first responders in their area with gift cards to show appreciation for their service.

Boulder Church Puts Teens to Work » For the second summer in a row, Boulder Adventist Church has provided an internship program for teens (13–18). The four 2017 interns—Tommy Eickmann (17), Luke Leiden (14), Jonah De Oliveira (13), and Joshua De Oliveira (17)—have worked hard on a wide range of activities over the summer. They ran Café Sanitas, providing light snacks and drinks to hikers, cyclists, and passers-by, began an urban garden, refinished chairs, built a concrete cave, supervised games and activities at Vacation Bible School, and prepared the church for worship each week.



The internship was not all about physical labor. Pastor Jessyka Albert, coordinator of the program, places a high value on using the experience to help give the teens greater ownership of the church. "It really gives them a chance to learn more about themselves, about others, and about the world around them," she said. The teens attended a church vision board meeting and learned about how their ideas and input can help shape church culture. They also had the freedom to take ownership of various projects, such as Café Sanitas, through strategizing about the effectiveness of different operating hours, developing menu items, and meeting with one local business about the possibility of partnership. They took vocational and personality tests, such as StrengthsQuest and Myers-Briggs, designed to help them learn more about how they can make a difference in the church and the world. They also devoted time each day to prayer and Bible study.

The summer program was rewarding in different ways for each of the teens. Jonah De Oliveira says, "I liked talking to people when we did the café. The internship was fun and I learned how to mix concrete!" Luke Leiden particularly enjoyed the personality tests. "I found out a lot about myself, what I should do with my life, and how I can help the church." Joshua De Oliveira recommends the internship as "a great summer job" that helped him gain new practical and social skills while doing useful work. Tommy Eickmann says, "It's a great way to get involved in the local community and I think this is really important."

Pastor Jessyka recalls some of her favorite moments: "Joshua was so excited when the CEO of Good Spread stopped by to offer us peanut butter to use in our café. Tommy would be reading a commentary in preparation for his upcoming sermon (August 5), and would often pause to share a new discovery with the group. Jonah reacted to his personality test results by exclaiming, 'I'm going to [be] such a cool dad someday!' Luke connected so well with his small group at Vacation Bible School, singing and dancing alongside them with such joy!"




