

Church Planting High on RMC Executive Committee

Agenda » "We rejoice that after months of intentional outreach, the Castle Rock church plant will have its opening on Sabbath, April 22. They have been preparing and building a core of leaders in preparation of this," said Ed Barnett, RMC president, in his opening remarks at the March 21 RMC Executive Committee meeting.

He also informed the committee that consultations with the ministerial team of the Newday Christian Seventh-day Adventist Church in Parker, have resulted in accepting a vision and plans to organize a church plant for the Denver downtown metro area in the near future.



"We need to look at providing funding for this exciting project and see it come to fruition before the 2018 outreach series with Shawn Boonstra," Barnett commented. The committee voted to request that RMC administration allocate funding for the project.

Several financial items were presented by George Crumley, RMC VP for finance. He reported that through the first two months of 2017, RMC base tithe was down by 13.81 percent. "Base tithe is what the conference budgets on and excludes tithe windfalls, and one of the reasons it is lower is because in the previous calendar year, we had nine Sabbaths through the end of February, and in 2017 we had one less," he said.

Crumley added that "except for the impact of the lower tithe on our operating fund, we are tracking pretty close to what we budgeted." Friday, March 24, 2017

It was also reported that the auditors are to conclude their work this week ahead of schedule. "They have given the conference a clean audit opinion, which is the best opinion granted," Crumley commented.

The Adventist Book Center on the revised year-end financial report actually ended with a gain of \$4,349 as opposed to the loss of \$1,230 that was initially reported.

Crumley also reported that the ACS building together with the equipment associated with it has also been sold. "These funds will be utilized based on a policy the conference is developing which will be shared at the May Executive Committee for final approval," Crumley stated.

Among other agenda items, the Committee voted an to call Doug Inglish, currently trust director for Minnesota Conference, as RMC trust director. He will join the RMC team as of June 1.

The committee also voted to approve the status change of the Arvada Indonesian Group to Arvada Indonesian Company.

Crumley reported that the sale of the Campion Industrial Park complex will likely close within the next 60 days. Funds will be used to reimburse RMC for past Academy payments made to keep the park solvent, and to benefit Campion Academy.

It was also voted to move forward with the construction of a warehouse building at Glacier View Ranch for storage of equipment, as funding is set aside for that project.

The committee also approved a request from RMC administration to establish a Conference Safety and Risk Management Committee. The purpose of the committee is to address the protection and stewardship of the assets entrusted to the local church and conference. This will allow RMC to focus on areas where the church has seen an increase in losses.

In preparation for the RMC Constituency Session, the committee approved Session agenda, as well as reviewed and approved recommended changes to RMC By-laws which will be presented to the Session in July.



Homeless Community Welcomes Kaleo Project to

Hawaii » Thirty-one young people from Colorado and Wyoming returned this week from Kaleo Project 2017, a mission trip to Oahu, having made a difference for Tent City, a community in Waianae tucked in the woods behind the harbor where as many as 300 of Hawaii's homeless pitch their tents. Additionally, they remodeled parts of Camp Waianae, Hawaii Conference's summer camp.



"We have been called to share God's love here in Hawaii," said Nestor Soriano, Campion Academy Church pastor evangelism and worship pastor. Isaiah 43:7 tells us God created us for His glory, Kaleo means "to be called."

God's love was shared through an evangelistic campaign given for the inhabitants of Tent City and a Vacation Bible School for their 70-plus kids, along with making improvements in Camp Waianae by painting the dining hall, erecting a fence, and taking care of "all those little things that nobody wants to do."

Partnering with the Hawaii Conference and local Adventist churches, Project Kaleo 2017 was able to make a large contribution. "I'm excited to do ministry on this island because there's so much need," expressed Erik Vandenburgh, youth leader for the Hawaii Conference.

In preparation for the mission trip, Shannon Werner, Kaleo





Project coordinator, and Erik Vandenburgh met with Tent City mayor Auntie Twinkle to inquire if they could bring a group of volunteers to minister to the kids who live there.

Mayor Twinkle's 17-year-old nephew had attended summer camp after he met a camp staff member who urged him to come and she was so impressed with the change she saw in his life when he returned that she said, "We want to do whatever we can to get our kids to go to summer camp."



"What if we bring summer camp to you?" Shannon and Erik asked. Her excitement over this possibility opened the door to holding day camp, evening programs and an evangelistic series for Tent City.

Chris and Don Hill, RMC Pathfinder coordinators known for their big support of youth activities, headed for the island weeks before the students to do preparatory work. Don helped build and paint a new office for the summer camp and Chris, besides being Don's helper, sewed costumes for summer camp skits and plays, creating, among many other things, three Roman soldier garments with leather skirts.

"The 300 people who live in Tent City appreciated the food, music and stories and real caring they received from our Kaleo team," said Chris Hill, "and our camp is a better place for our having been here," she finished.

"I really wanted to come help people," explained Jocelyn Curiel, a student from Aurora, Colorado, but people said, 'You're going on a mission trip to *Hawaii*?'" Her answer was, "Yeah, there's need everywhere."

Ruiz de Espinoza also shared with women ways to cope with difficult situations through her charisma and humor. Laughter could be heard throughout the fellowship hall; but there were also serious moments, as when tears were shed by attendees.

"What I enjoyed most from the event was the spirit of unity and acceptance among the women," says Rochelle Pérez, attendee of the certification event. "Although there were women from various congregations, it felt like we all became part of a larger sisterhood. We learned so much about ways to take care of ourselves and how to connect with God. Overall, I know everyone benefitted from this event."

Third and Fourth Graders at Vista Ridge Academy
Learn About Environmental Conservation » The kids
are obviously excited as they file into the library at Vista Ridge
Academy, whispering and pointing at the various stations set
up around the room. There are bear canisters, climbing
harnesses, animal pelts, goggles, axes, helmets, and other
specialized equipment. They show remarkable restraint—not
touching a thing!—and take their seats on the floor to listen to
a presentation by two rangers visiting from Rocky Mountain
National Park (RMNP).



Riley Cavanaugh and Sarin Lomascolo are two of the five rangers assigned to the Environmental Education Program at RMNP. They do both onsite and offsite programs for school children, teaching them about the national parks through interactive activities and experiences. After a short presentation about the purpose of protected places in the U.S. —including national parks, national monuments, and national historic sites—they direct the kids to explore the stations, trying to determine for themselves the kind of work a ranger might do with the tools and equipment provided.

The students try on clothing and harnesses and ask questions to identify some of the less obvious tools. At the end of the session, they present what they've learned creatively through drama, speech, and by demonstrating the items and tools used in the park.

The theme this year for third and fourth graders has been "Celebrating National Parks." Classroom teacher Shondra Cizek explains, "This was one of our project-based learning or real-life learning projects. Our project had many components including a discovery unit about camping which integrated math, science, writing, critical thinking, art, research, design and building. Students built 3D campsite models and researched camping sites across the world. They planned many details for their camping trips and wrote in their camping booklets."

The students also took a walk where they collected nature items which were later displayed in shadow boxes. They wrote and published a class book on national parks, with each student choosing a particular park to research, illustrate, and write about. They presented their learning to the fifth and sixth grade class.



Stewardship was a focal point throughout this theme and for the visiting rangers as well; they repeatedly emphasized the importance of protecting resources. The kids were enthusiastic in their support of this concept. When asked about a place he'd like to protect, William Barton, a third grader, chose his aunt's house, "because of all the frogs." Jonathan Wernick, also in third grade, talked about how important it is to protect "the beauty and the animals" in our country.

Vista Ridge Academy believes experiential learning is vital, particularly during the elementary school years when children are naturally so energetic, curious, and engaged in discovery of the world around them. Mrs. Cizek says, "I find these kinds of real-life learning projects provide long-term retention and improved critical thinking skills. In this case, the project has really helped the kids develop greater passion for God's creation and the National Parks."

Powerful testimonies and beautiful music were in abundance, but the real power of the Holy Spirit showed up best in the children from several local churches, Adventist, Baptist, and Methodist, who gathered at the Adventist church to sing praises to our Lord and savior, Jesus.

Lighthouse School Tops Accreditation Rankings »

When we write about our achievements, it's only a partial satisfaction. When others write about us in a positive way, it says that we are doing something right. An article in the *Fort Morgan Times* entitled, Top Accreditation for Lighthouse School, March 22, reports on the school's educational achievement. The Lighthouse School received top ratings from two national accreditors. Below is the article from Fort Morgan Times:

The parents who send their children to Lighthouse Seventhday Adventist Christian School probably already know they picked a good school for their kids, but that sentiment is more official since the small, private, religious school in Fort Morgan received top ratings from two national school accrediting organizations.

Lighthouse Principal Jodie Aakko found out earlier in March that both the National Council for Private School Accreditation and the Accrediting Association of Seventh-day Adventist Schools, Colleges, and Universities bestowed that high status on Lighthouse SDA School.

Lighthouse SDA School, which opened three years ago and is located at 700 W. Meeker St. in Fort Morgan, previously had a provisional accreditation.

The accreditation the school has received is not just for the coming school year; it is set to last for a half dozen years. But her school being able to reach that milestone meant going through a very involved process, she said.

"The comprehensive accreditation evaluation involved the staff, students, parents and school board members," Aakko said.

That evaluation took into account 10 different areas, she explained, and those included everything from the school's "philosophical foundation to information technology."

About the latter, the school offers computers for each student at their desks "so that they can utilize technology for numerous purposes," the school's website states.

The people conducting the accreditation evaluation visited the school and provided feedback on what they witnessed, the principal said.

"The on-site accreditation representatives acknowledged many strengths at Lighthouse," Aakko said.

That included pointing out how the Lighthouse teachers were making intentional efforts to use "project-based learning" so that the students would be ready for the future, as well as how the teachers' "hard work" was evidenced through the annual gains being made by students on standardized academic testing, she said.

Also included in achieving the accreditation were commitments from the Lighthouse School Board to updating curriculum from the school toward involvement in community service projects.

"We are a small school, but the payoff is we have rigorous curriculum, multi-grade classrooms, and an unprecedented student-to-teacher ratio of 9 to 1," Lighthouse School Board Chairman Dr. Elias Hernandez said. "Our students thrive in an educational environment which provides project-based learning, regular field trips and leadership opportunities."

Lighthouse SDA Christian School currently serves approximately 18 students across first through eighth grades, teaching them about "core Christian values" and the Bible, as well as academic classes in science, social studies, reading, writing, handwriting, spelling, phonics, mathematics, physical education, choir, hand chimes, art and drama, according to <u>lighthousesdachristianschool.org</u>.
Classes meet Monday through Thursday.


