
Mid-America Union Leaders Returned by Constituency Vote For New Term » The eighth quinquennial Mid-America Union Constituency Session convened on Sunday, September 11 in the College View Church in Lincoln, Nebraska for the purpose of receiving reports, celebrating accomplishments and voting church business.



The one-day session, themed Collaborating for Ministry in the Heartland, brought together nearly 290 delegates-representing 69,000 members in six conferences--to review and discuss the progress of the Seventh-day Adventist Church in Mid-America from 2011-2015.

The afternoon began with musical praise from the Union College Unionaires, led by Dr. Ricky Little. Elder G. Alexander Bryant, secretary of the North American Division, shared a devotional thought based on Jesus' conversation with a Samaritan woman by a well. Bryant pointed out how she tried to elevate the question of where to worship to an inappropriately high level. Bryant challenged delegates to remain focused on the most important topics in church ministry.

During his president's report, Elder Gary Thurber thanked Elder Tom Lemon for his four years of leadership in the MidFriday, September 16, 2016

Daughters of Grace Retreat America Union before Lemon was called to serve at the General Conference in July 2015. Thurber also thanked the conference presidents for their leadership in Mid-America.

Elder Gil Webb, MAUC vice president for administration, reported that Mid-America has seen slow but steady membership growth during the past five years, and Troy Peoples, vice president for finance, reviewed the union's fiscal records, showing moderate positive trends. Vinita Sauder, president of Union College also shared a report, as did Brad Forbes, director of AdventSource and Ken Bacon, representing Adventist Health System. Tom Evans, treasurer for the NAD, was also on hand to assist with proceedings.

Following a lively discussion, delegates rejected a proposed change to the union's constitution and bylaws that would have reduced the size of the MAUC Executive Committee. Delegates strongly favored retaining 35 members to ensure adequate representation.

Daniel R. Jackson NAD president, led the Nominating Committee in conducting a thorough review of incumbent evaluations before receiving the recommendation that each be renominated. Delegates voted by generous majorities to elect all officers and departmental directors to another fiveyear term. Visit Local Businesses » Lighthouse Christian School students in grades 1-4 visited downtown Fort Morgan businesses during their Future Entrepreneurs in Action field trip August 31.

Walking from the school to downtown Fort Morgan, they stopped at JCPenney, The Flower Petaler, Rent-A-Center and Bank of Colorado, according to Jodie Aakko, head teacher at Lighthouse.

After touring each retail shop, the owner/manager gave students a short summary of the business. Students interviewed their hosts, asking how their business is doing, what future plans they have for the business, the easiest and most difficult parts of running a business, how their business helps the community and how prices are determined. also asked what advice they had for students who might run their own business in the future.



"The students were thrilled to see -- first-hand and in their very own community -- business owners putting into practice the very principles and concepts which the students studied in class," Aakko said. "Several students were inspired on future career choices."

Before the field trip, students had formed teams and created their own mock businesses, including a pizza restaurant and a lumberyard, during their economics studies. "Each team selected a business name and created a sign that included a tag line, prices, incentives, products, features/specials and customer service features," Aakko explained. So the field trip held a lot of meaning for the students.

At the Bank of Colorado, students received, according to Aakko, "a special behind-the-scenes tour of what banking is all about." They heard about its general operations, the workings of loans, safety deposit boxes, savings accounts, credit scores and even compound interest.

This was "not only a day of learning about economics, but a day of connecting personally with their community in a fun, adventurous way, which in turn inspired [them] to become responsible citizens," Aakko said. "It was a great day to watch my students get excited about the many options their futures hold."

"The flower shop let us go into the refrigerator to see all the flowers," said fourth-grader Brayden Farmer. And "we got to see the safe at the bank and the safety deposit boxes."

"We went to four places to find out information to see if we want to start our own business someday," said third-grader Clara Aakko.



"It was fun because we got flowers!" enthused first-grader Leah Alvarado.

"This week, students will 'open' their [mock] stores to customers (classmates), who are eager to spend their 'lighthouse' money."

Aakko created a game the students play which is related to their studies where they draw cards and

deal with whatever business-related scenario is on the card. Possibilities include health department fines for not washing hands, pine beetles infesting lumber and renting out the restaurant for a party.

The final part of the economics project will be writing about it and brainstorming what they learned to create a book," Aakko said.

"We owe a great amount of thanks to JCPenney, Flower Petaler, Rent-A-Center and Bank of Colorado for taking time out of their busy schedules to educate and inspire these young future entrepreneurs," Aakko said.
