
Focus on Youth, Evangelism Discussed at RMC Executive Committee » Ministry by and for youth surfaced as a focus of the September 20 Executive Committee of the Rocky Mountain Conference. Commenting on the Education Department's report by Lonnie Hetterle, Ed Barnett, president, said "we are making young people a focus in our conference."



His remarks referenced outreach activities involving students, the service-based learning approach at Campion Academy, initiatives undertaken by youth in different churches, and a record attendance of 671 participants in the youth camp season.

His comments were echoed when the issue of training for evangelism was discussed in connection with the upcoming health series by Mark Finley for the Denver Metro area in the fall of 2017, as well as the Voice of Prophecy planning for the 2018 evangelism series with Shawn Boonstra, also in Denver. The committee members were informed about a focused training and outreach preparation involving pastors and laity.

Commenting on the potential that such ministry training can be beneficial to other regions of the country beyond the Denver area, Lynn Nicolai, a committee member from Friday, September 23, 2016

Executive Committee September 20, 8 a.m. - Noon Palisade said, "the more we are training the adults or youth, the more potential it has to affect many other areas. Often we are thinking about the ministry training programs for adults, but we need to consider ministry training for youth [who would gain] new insights and new skills for evangelism, for sharing Christ." Reporting on the current finances of the



Conference, George Crumley said that year-todate tithe without windfall is 4.83 percent as of July, and RMC Advance is up 14.62 percent. "We are in a strong financial position," he

said.

In an Education Department update, Lonnie Hetterle reported that last year's graduating academy seniors received a total of 2.9 million dollars in scholarships to Union College. He shared that our schools continue to "give a strong character and knowledge base for our students as they embark on the future. The employment projections tell us that 60 percent of the jobs these students will fill have not even been invented yet," Hetterle said. "It is important to equip them with a sound educational background."

Students who graduated from Campion Academy will have completed at least 15 hours of service for others," said Don Reeder, principal. "There is a strong spiritual atmosphere on campus exemplified by the Wednesday night break-out sessions for Bible study and spiritual activities," he reported.

The committee also voted to grant the Agape Haitian congregation based in Aurora to become a church rather than a company of believers. Though listing 61 church members, the congregation has an attendance of 85 every week. The Head-shaving of Ed Barnett: Campion Academy Wins His Hair and More Students » It was more than a year ago when Campion Academy looked at its viability as a serious contributor to Adventist education and designed an increased enrollment program. More recently, Ed Barnett, president of Rocky Mountain Conference and Campion Academy's board chairman, stepped in with a personal pledge.



Barnett promised he would get his head shaved if their marketing delivered at least 150 students for the new academic year. Recruiter Jessica Rios took the

challenge on during a conversation at Wyoming Camp Meeting in July about enrollment projections for the academy. "If I do not deliver at least 150 students, I would cut my hair off," Jessica said. A deal was struck between Ed Barnett and Jessica Rios which Ed lost.

The deal helped Jessica "to be more intentional in the recruiting because I wasn't going to get my hair shaved," she commented.

"My hair will grow back," said Ed Barnett, "but I am thrilled to see Campion bouncing back, too, and doing it so seriously. Kudos to all involved," he added.

His promise was personal and his word went around the Conference. On the last day of summer, September 21, in the presence of the entire student body, faculty, and staff, the deed was done.



There was no end to the cheering and applause. Selfies were taken with the willing victim, and the haircut variations were attempted. Delight shot across Jessica's face as she shaved Ed Barnett's head with a "Reeder hair option" (a nearbald look) and transformed his thick, curly gray hair into a becoming new hair style. Donna Reeder, who regularly cuts hair for her husband, Don, principal of Campion Academy, delivered the final cut.

With his curls falling down, Ed Barnett commented, "I'm glad I can't see what it looks like. I'm not a bit sorry."

"It was a pretty good bet. He's definitely down to earth about it," said Faith Paden, a sophomore watching the event.

Raelynn Kelley, senior, said in a straight-forward manner, "He looks good with hair."

"From the front, it's not that bad," commented Nati Joya, junior.

109-year-old school as we lift up Christ. We added our creativity, focused on spirituality and mission, and intentional marketing to keep us on track," explained Donavan Reeder.

The school's enrollment in 2014 bottomed with 128 students, then in 2015, increased slightly to 135. Today, the




Perea and his family arrived in Loveland this past week from Texas where he has been pastoring. He will focus on youth and discipleship and will preach his initial sermon on November 12.
